Making Sense of Abstinence: Lessons for Comprehensive Sex Education. Bill Taverner and Sue Montfort. Planned Parenthood of Greater Northern New Jersey. 2005. Stresses the importance of all persons defining abstinence for themselves, while teaching accurate information, empowering teens to make good decisions regarding sexual health.

New Vision: A Culturally Sensitive Life Planning Curriculum. Ruth Cohen, Eric Jackson, and Dawn Caballero. Planned Parenthood of Wisconsin. 1991. Designed with African American and Hispanic students in mind. Units cover communication, self esteem, reproductive health, planning for the future, interpersonal relationships, and sexuality. Activities in Spanish are included.

Reducing the Risk: Building Skills to Prevent Pregnancy, STDs and HIV. 3rd ed. Richard P. Barth. ETR. 1996. Sixteen lessons consisting of role plays, class discussion, and homework assignments that focus on helping students improve interpersonal skills and giving them confidence in their abilities to manage difficult situations.

Removing the Risk: Abstinence for High School Students. Richard P. Barth and Nancy Abbey. ETR. 1997. Ten lessons modeling refusal skills and providing a positive approach to abstinence as a viable alternative for students.


